The Instructions

Keep a tracking sheet of your accomplishments for your own records (a Google doc is fine).

The Participation Quest

The Networking Quest

There are no limits on how many times you do each of these activities. You must record each and tally your points. They are each worth one point.

The Networking Quest (continued)


For the below tasks, you may get one point for each person who signs.




Share the conference link with a friend who is not presenting; they must log in online for an entire workshop or panel. Note the friend's name on your tracking sheet.

Scholarship often requires a bit of imagination. Each activity below is worth one point. You may earn multiple points when meme-making (each meme Tweeted is worth 1 point), but only one opportunity to guess the word-count for each dissertation.

Meme the conference! Take a picture during the conference and make a meme of it. Malicious memes will not count. Tweet the picture, using #HUODU2015. Mark on your tracking sheet for each meme you make.
Swag your selfie! Snap a pic during the conference, and make it look fancybe sure to tell us what digital tool(s) you used to create your masterpiece when you tweet it or post it to Facebook using #HUODU2105.
